**"Religion, Religiosity, and the Moral Divide in Canadian Politics" by Professor John Petrocik

The focus has overshadowed the influence of the social issues. "ECONOMIC GROWTH, ENERGY AND THE NORTH AMERICAN DESTINY" presented by Dr. Bryne Purchase, Queens University, Ontario, Canada

The short history of economic growth focuses principally on the human institutions that promote rapid technological change. In this regard, geography is not destiny. Rather, institutions hold center stage. But even the most sophisticated tools do not work without energy; and humans cannot live without it. This speech outlines the central importance of energy to economic growth. It then reviews how Canada and the United States, while having marginal differences in their institutions, have become more deeply integrated around the energy sector of their two economies and how this fortune of geography will distinguish their mutual destiny from the decline of Europe and the rise of Asia.
